Jean Prandini has been a Maui resident for the past 38 years, and active in the community for just as long. She volunteered with Kaunoa Senior Services and AARP, and has dedicated her life on Maui to giving back to the community.

As someone who has spent years dedicated to helping others, Hale Makua wasn't even on her radar. From what she had heard from others, "Hale Makua was not a place you would want to visit or see."

That was until 2016 when Jean had a fall at home and needed in-patient occupational and physical therapy to help her recover. In addition to being a nursing home where frail elders and disabled individuals lived, the Kahului campus is also home to a rehabilitation center that helps individuals of all ages recover from injury or illness. During her stay at Hale Makua Kahului Jean became better acquainted with staff.

For a woman who is not easily impressed, she was impressed with the care that she received. Hale Makua was not the place that people told her about. "There's vibrancy and life at Hale Makua. It's not a depressing place, but a place where people continue living and thriving."

Jean has always been a strong, independent woman, who has done things on her own terms at a pace that would have those a fourth her age hard pressed

to keep up. After another fall at home she realized that she was physically starting to slow down and needed a bit more help, Jean began evaluating her options.

With no family on Maui and her friends aging as well, Jean thought that she should stay at Hale Makua, and in April 2017, made it her permanent residence. She says, "It's an ideal place to live. Everything is provided. I've reached the age where you need that type of guidance."

"I appreciate that Hale Makua is here for me during a time where I can no longer do everything myself. My meals are prepared, my clothing laundered, and staff are available 24-hours a day if I need them. Plus, I have Donna Tabion {Social Worker}, to assist me with my affairs." Donna was there to help Jean when she made the decision to make a planned gift to Hale Makua in the form of an annuity. She chose to leave Hale Makua a gift after her passing, in large part because she was impressed with the organization's plans for the future, in expanding to the neighboring Kahului Community Center land. (Read the more about plans on the next page.) Jean's hope is that "this gift encourages others to step up and give as well."

Jean is no stranger to fighting to make Maui a better place, and this donation is no exception. "We are so grateful for Jean. Her gift will help in creating a vibrant community for seniors to age in place and receive needed health services, leaving a legacy for generations to come," says Hale Makua CEO, Wesley Lo.



#### News from CEO Wes Lo



Previously we shared our initial plans to create a Master Plan for Hale Makua Kahului in an effort to plan for the rapidly growing number of seniors. According to a Department of Business, Economic Development and Tourism (DBEDT) report, Maui County's population of individuals ages 65 and over is anticipated to grow by 25,282 or 92% from 2016 to 2045.

With a dramatic rise in the senior population, we need to change the way healthcare is delivered. There is a growing trend for more rehab services as hospitals discharge patients more quickly post-surgery. In addition, individuals now expect private rooms with modern amenities in which to recover.

Originally built in 1965 and 1978, Hale Makua Wailuku and Hale Makua Kahului respectively are aging and extremely difficult to modify. The extensive renovations that would be necessary are cost prohibitive.

The Kahului Community Center gate ball field adjacent to Hale Makua Kahului is an ideal site for expansion. We are working with the County of Maui on a lease which would also include the Kahului Community Center up to the Kokua Pool. The County would ensure that there are replacement facilities and fields in place prior to turning over land control.

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## 15 Years of comfort, care at Hale Makua

Kitty Thompson lived at Hale Makua Kahului for 15 years before passing on December 11, 2017. Her only son, Rick Thompson, believes that bringing his mom to Hale Makua was one of the best decisions he's ever made.

"The second she moved into Hale Makua, a huge burden felt like it was lifted off of me. I knew I was getting her the best possible care, and that's what she deserved."

"The staff showed both my mom and my family nothing but compassion and love. They kept me well informed about anything and everything that was going on. It really put me at ease."

While Kitty was still active, she loved going on outings, playing bingo and participating in other activities including the Maui Special Fair Day. "Mom loved the Special Fair Day, and I took her with the Activities team until she wasn't well enough to go anymore. We never missed a year."

"Before deciding on Hale Makua, I tried everything to care for my mom on my own. I left my family in south Maui and moved to Pukalani where mom lived. It was then that I realized how bad her Alzheimer's disease really was, and that she was going

to need a tremendous amount of support." When determining how best to care for his mom, Rick recalled that his father once stayed at Hale Makua for a short time and he was really appreciative of the services. "I spoke with Margie (Albete) in Admissions, and felt really confident that we were making the right decision. I have been very pleased ever since."

Care partners, also reflected on special times they shared with Kitty. Ella Rosetes, the Clerk who worked on Kitty's neighborhood the entire time Kitty lived there shared, "One of my favorite memories of Kitty, was when she participated in the first Miss Valentine Pageant. Her son bought her a beautiful red gown and we did her make-up. She looked beautiful, and was so happy!" "Kitty loved singing, especially 'You Are My Sunshine' and 'Let Me Call You Sweetheart'. As her cognitive impairment worsened, you could always connect with her by singing one of those songs," Ella shared.

Rick appreciates the staff for the care his mom received, their patience and understanding. "My mom was a tough cookie, and definitely gave the staff and nurses a run for their money, especially as her Alzheimer's worsened, but they were always patient and kind and took really great care of her."

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# **Tournament raises funds for charities**



More than a dozen Maui non-profit organizations, including Hale Makua Health Services, benefitted from the 2018 Sentry Tournament of Champions. Checks totaling over \$310,000 were presented to the charities today at Lahainaluna High School's Sue D. Cooley Stadium.

# **Adult Day Health gives peace of mind**



Evelyn Santos' life changed immensely after losing her husband a few months ago. In fact, her entire family had to make adjustments while grieving their loss. Her family soon realized that Evelyn needed more attention and care as her Alzheimer's became more apparent and being home alone was no longer safe. One of Evelyn's daughters, Donlyn Santos, took on a lot of the responsibility of caring for her mom in addition to caring her own large family. Donlyn felt overwhelmed with the added responsibility and desperately needed help.

That's when Donlyn helped Evelyn apply to our Adult Day Health Program.

Evelyn, like many people, does not qualify for Medicaid and cannot afford to pay privately for care five days a week. Fortunately, Hale Makua received a three year grant from the Hawaii Community Foundation Persons in Need (PIN) for Elderly Services Program, which supports programs that help kupuna remain in the community and their caregivers lead balanced lives. This grant allows Hale Makua to provide scholarships to qualifying Day Health clients and covers the fee for additional days, which in Evelyn's case is two days.

Hale Makua was awarded the PIN

grant in 2016 and continues through 2018. In that time, 17 clients were able to attend more days of our Adult Day Health program. A large focus of the PIN Program is supporting our client's caregivers because their well-being is just as important to the person receiving care. Our Day Health staff regularly checks in with family caregivers to make sure they are getting enough support and receive education to properly care for their loved one at home while caring for themselves.

Since attending Adult Day Health, Donlyn has peace of mind knowing that her mom is safe and cared for and she has seen a positive change in Evelyn. "I am able to care for myself and my family. I am so thankful that mom gets to socialize and exercise regularly, and she was excited to win a bingo game last week. She is much happier."

Adult Day Health by Hale Makua is licensed by the Hawaii Department of Health. Our goal is to maintain or restore our clients' ability to remain at home. For more information about Adult Day Health and scholarships available, please call 871-9287.

# **Apprenticeship Program Approved**

Hale Makua Health Services received approval from the State of Hawaii Department of Labor and Industrial Relations on its plans to launch a Nursing Assistant Apprenticeship to provide 2,000 hours or one year of on-the-job learning and related instruction to enable the apprentice to attain the required competencies of a Nurse Aide.

The first group that will receive apprentice training will be Hale Makua Health Services' third class of graduates from its Nurse Aide Training Program that completed their course work on July 8, 2018. The goal of the Nursing Assistant Apprenticeship is to complement the Nurse Aide Training Program by providing additional on-the-job training and support for Nursing Assistants employed at one of Hale Makua's nursing homes.

The apprenticeship will develop skills and proficiency around the areas of communication, resident care, restorative care, resident rights, documentation, infection control and safety. In addition, apprentices will receive in-depth training on medical terminology, first aid including CPR and use of an AED, Dementia care, and culture change.

We celebrated National Volunteer Appreciation Week from April 15 – 21, and are incredibly grateful for volunteers like you. Hale Makua Health Services is fortunate to have volunteers who actively play a role in the lives of our residents every day. In 2017, 100 volunteers provided a total of 6,764 hours of service to the organization. Independentsector.org calculates a monetary value for volunteer time each year, and this year the hourly value of a volunteer in Hawaii is \$23.80. This means that in 2017, Hale Makua volunteers have contributed over \$160,000 worth of their time to Hale Makua.

We are grateful for each of them and the special connections they make with the residents. ### Stephanie takes strides to get home



Stephanie Smith is 53 years young, and has a vibrant personality that welcomes everyone she encounters. Maybe it's her 25 year history as a Social Worker, or maybe it's just something she's always embodied, but there's no denying that she's one tough cookie.

In early May, while meeting up with a friend to go snorkeling on her birthday, she took a wrong step, lost her balance and fell. She knew the moment she hit the ground that some major damage had been done. She tore her ACL and cracked her right femur.

After losing a pint of blood, and having a rod and screws placed in her knee and femur, Stephanie was sent to Rehab by Hale Makua for physical and occupational therapies. "I can't say enough about how great my experience has been here. I have so much respect for everyone who works here and their level of professionalism and compassion," gushes Stephanie.

For a little over a month, Stephanie worked hard every day with occupational and physical therapists to help her get back on her feet. "Just yesterday, I walked 90 steps without any assistance, which was a huge accomplishment for me." Stephanie says that the therapists were all incredible, accommodating, attentive.

One of the things that impressed

Stephanie the most was how flexible and understanding the therapists were about her needs and interests. "I'm a Basketball fan, and I was here right during playoffs. Myself and another woman who were here for rehab wanted to watch a game that was on TV right during our scheduled therapy time, so the therapists took us out to where the big TV was in the courtyard area and we got to watch the game and do our therapy. It was pretty awesome."

Stephanie sang the praises of her incredible therapists, nurses and CNAs and especially her physician Dr. Gupta. "Dr. Gupta was probably my favorite person here. I really wish she could be my permanent Primary Care Physician. Her bedside manner, compassion, and listening ear were so wonderful and comforting, she was really incredible".

Stephanie's recovery has been really impressive, and for that we give credit to our amazing team of care partners. From nursing to therapists, and everyone in between. Stephanie is back on her feet and back to doing the things she loves!
