1940

1939 - 1945: World War II

Prior to WWII, elderly men on Maui who were in need of residential care not otherwise available to them were housed in a separate building on the grounds of the old Malulani hospital in Wailuku which was known as the "Old Men's Home".

1950

Aug 17, 1947: Hale Makua opens its 24-bed home.

Aug 1946: Volunteers begin construction of the new home in Happy Valley.

Sept 20, 1946: An organizational meeting of the Board of Trustees is held.

1945: After the end of WWII. the YBA wanted to resume religious activities at their hall, and took it upon themselves to build a new home for the men.

Early 1942: The elderly men are transferred to the basement of the Young Buddhist Association (YBA) Hall on Vineyard St. in Wailuku. Salvation Army representatives take over care and supervision.

Dec 1941: Shortly after the outbreak of WWII, the military occupies Malulani Hospital and requests evacuation of patients including those receiving elderly care.





Hospital is turned over Hale Makua due to need for expansion, and residents move in

Aug 19, 1953: Old Malulani



1953: Hale Makua welcomes first female resident.









1970

1968: Hale Makua Wailuku opens up Lanai wing, bringing the facility's total number of beds to 124.

1968: Hale Makua pioneers home health care services on Maui.

March 1966: Hale Makua Wailuku opens 70-bed facility that was built on the grounds of the Malulani Hospital building that was demolished.

1980

1978: Hale Makua Kahului opens its doors, providing 120 "Swing beds" for residents needing intermediate or skilled



March 1965: Groundbreaking for Wailuku facility. Due to aging conditions and hazards, the old Malulani building was demolished and a new facility rebuilt on the grounds.

Day Health Program starts at Kahului facility to serve adults restorative and requiring rehabilitative services during the day.

1987

The Hale Makua Foster Family Care program introduced to provide quality, personalized care in foster family settings as an alternative to nursing home care.

1991

1996

Kahului expands by 118 beds with the opening of the Weinberg Care Center.

Kahului adds a 16-bed short-stay rehab wing, bringing the total number of beds in the Kahului facility to 254.

2002

Hale Makua becomes affiliated with Ohana Pacific Health.
